Eisenhower Urgent Care

We operate three facilities designed to treat patients on a walk-in basis:

- Fractures, sprains, cuts and scrapes, rashes and minor injuries
- Infections, including those of the ear, throat, sinus and urinary tract
- Cold, flu and fever
- Suture removal or wound check

Each location also provides routine vaccinations and school physicals. The facilities offer onsite laboratory capabilities such as urinalysis, influenza screening, pregnancy testing and glucose monitoring. Onsite radiology services allow for quick diagnosis of fractures and sprains. If needed, patients may be referred to a physician for specialized medical care or hospitalization.

Ambulance Transportation

In a life-threatening emergency, the sooner a patient is treated, the better the chances of survival. In our area, an ambulance typically arrives in five minutes or less, bringing vital equipment and trained medics who can stabilize a patient and begin some treatments before even reaching the hospital.

It's a common misconception that driving a loved one to the emergency room is faster or better — in fact, when it comes to lifethreatening symptoms, the opposite is true.
